- Minimum of 10 people in most classes in order for it to run. (So please register EARLY if you are interested!)

Blended Learning: Transform Your Instruction to Personalize Student Learning

Course Description: Everyone is talking about blended learning, and its power to personalize student learning. This face-to-face course is a "roll up your sleeves" workshop style course designed to introduce K-12 teachers to blended learning and support them in transitioning to a blended environment in their classrooms. How Do We Help These Kids? Understanding and Addressing the Social-Emotional Needs of Students with High Functioning Autism

Description: This course, designed for elementary and middle school teachers, will focus on an examination and overview of practical classroom strategies to support the emotional and social functioning of students with High Functioning Autism Syndrome. Specific attention will be given to proactively identifying elements in a behavior cycle, with consideration given to interrupting this cycle at various stages of development in order to de-escalate behavior at the earliest stage. Aspects of cognitive and communicative vulnerabilities of this population will be addressed. User-friendly mindfulness techniques, designed to reduce anxiety and stress, will be introduced in this course. The overall learning goal is to explore ideas & strategies teachers can use to enhance attention, self-regulation, social competence, & students' overall well-being. This course fulfills the re-certification requirement of 15 hours of professional development in Special Education.

ONLINE PDPs! An Introduction to Teaching ESL/EFL

Description: Would you like to increase your effectiveness as an English language teacher? Would you like to go beyond the well-known methods that often leave teachers frustrated with their one-size-fits-all approach? This course will take you on a fascinating exploration of what it means to be a teacher, how to understand who your students are and the needs they have, and how to choose the most appropriate materials and activities for your classroom. You'll learn how you can choose and fine-tune the principles that exactly fit your teaching situation.

During the next six weeks, we'll rethink the traditional native vs. non-native speaker distinction, see why teaching English is so different from teaching other subjects, and explore innovative approaches like Communicative Language Teaching and the lexical approach. You'll gain new insights and ideas for teaching vocabulary, grammar, listening, speaking, reading, and writing.
